Happy New Year! I wish you that, but more particularly, I wish you a Happy Epiphany! And it's really about Epiphany that I want to say a few things today.

You know, it's not only COVID and its effects—it's other circumstances and realities that challenge us each day to be the positive and encouraging people that we know ourselves



truly to be. These can seem like dark days, and lately very cold days as well! In the face of that, I want to share with you some Good News that the feast of the Epiphany holds for me, especially thanks to a message from St. Leo the Great.

St. Leo the Great was pope from 440–461 – a long time ago. Reflecting on the event of the Epiphany – the visit of the wise men to the baby Jesus in the manger – Pope Leo had this to say: "... the star beckoned the three wise men out of their distant country and led them to recognize and adore the King of heaven and earth. The obedience of the star calls us to imitate its humble service: to be servants, as best we can, of the grace that invites everyone to find Christ. Dear friends, you must have the same zeal to be of help to one another; then, in the kingdom of God, to which faith and good works are the way, you will shine as children of the light ..."

The star of Bethlehem led the wise men to Jesus. The star helped them find their way in the darkness. The star wasn't the magi's goal; their goal was to find Jesus! But the star lit the way through the darkness. St. Leo is suggesting that we are like that star. Our goal in this time and place is to help others to find Jesus, the One who lifts us up and loves us. Strangely enough, except for our star, the sun, stars are only seen when it is very dark around us. We cannot see them at all when it is daylight. Only in the dark. When many seem lost and confused, we are called upon to lead them to the true Light, Jesus Christ. We carry that same light in our hearts, and by our words and actions we can lead others to Jesus. What an encouraging way to understand what we are to do – and be – in this time and place.

I wish you and the whole GrACE family many blessings as we journey into 2022. May we find light for our own path, and light and joy for everyone we meet along the way. May you be blessed throughout 2022.

Striving to Still the Storm

In Matthew's Gospel, chapter 8, verses 23–27, we hear how Jesus and his disciples were crossing the sea. A sudden storm arose, causing waves so high that the boat began to take on water. Massive panic ensued amongst those on the boat, and the disciples became afraid for their lives. We are told how Jesus was sleeping at the time and had to be awoken. The disciples exclaimed 'Lord save us! We are Perishing!' Jesus responded saying 'Why are you afraid, you of little faith?'

Jesus may have rebuked the disciples for their weak faith, but he didn't abandon them or let them drown. Instead, He calmed the storm and then continued to teach them who He was and demonstrated what it was to trust in God.

The significance of Jesus calming the storm is pertinent to what is happening in our world today, especially with the COVID-19 pandemic. The waters in our lives are not exactly calm right now. Daily, many face uncertainty, fear, and even death. At the best of times, life has its inherent challenges and the pandemic has only added a layer.

Over the course of the last couple of years, and during this pandemic, we have all had different and varied experiences with COVID-19. Some people have contracted COVID and became quite ill, some had mild symptoms and still others continue to face COVID with long-haul symptoms. Unfortunately, there are many who have lost loved ones and for this I'm sorry. God Bless their souls.

Why was Jesus sleeping on the boat? Was Jesus exhausted from his ministry and from continuous preaching and teaching to large crowds? Was he tired from continuously having people pull on his garments? It is likely that Jesus, in human form, was tired. Many of us are also tired and exhausted too. It is during these times, however, that we must rely and lean on our faith. The Lord will never abandon us!



As Catholics, and in Catholic education, we have the privilege and opportunity to share this very message and inspiration with the students we teach and with those we encounter, at work or in our personal lives. As Jesus stilled the storm, let us strive to still the storm in our lives and in the lives of others.

Like in the Gospel, let us hope our waters will soon become calm. Through prayer and trust in God, we know this will happen. We will get through this pandemic! By the light of our faith, we will persevere!

Dear Grateful Advocates for Catholic Education,

We have just completed the Christmas season of our liturgical year, a time that celebrates among other things, the solemn feasts of our Lord's Birth,

the Holy Family, the Epiphany and the Baptism of the Lord. Each of these celebrations gives us a particular insight into the light of Christ that breaks into the world, scattering the darkness of every age and giving hope to those in despair.

In the story of the Epiphany especially (Matthew 2:1–12), we learn how the wise men saw clearly because they had the light of a star. This star guided the wise men along their journey and then stopped over the place where Jesus was. Obviously, that is not how stars normally work. Something very much out of the ordinary is happening to alter the normal course of things. The extraordinary activity is that of God, leading the wise men to Jesus and, once they arrived, enabling them to see clearly. They did not see with unaided human vision; they saw with God's help. This teaches us that God, who reveals his Son to the world, wants people to see the revelation, and He acts to give the clear vision we need. The wise men were granted the light of a star. Our gift from God is the light of faith. In faith, we see with clear vision what God wants us to see: that Jesus is both God and man, given to us as Lord and Savior.

By God's grace, the star that appeared before the wise men, the star that now shines in the witness of the Church can now appear, through us, to those who do not yet know Christ and his Church, or who may simply be experiencing, especially in this time of pandemic, the darkness of this age without reference to Christ.

Our call as Grateful Advocates of Catholic Education is to demonstrate that the truth of the Gospel need not be feared; on the contrary it should be joyfully embraced. The wise men show us that this demonstration is given by the witness of worship and joy. Once they found Christ, they offered gifts and knelt down in worship and adoration. Here we see that worship, the act of self-surrender to Christ as God and King, is an act of surrender to the fullness of truth. As such, worship gives birth to joy.

So, then, throughout this new year, let us worship Christ with the whole gift of self, allow his joy to arise in our hearts, and make that joy visible to others. Then, by God's grace, the star that appeared to the wise men, the star that now shines in the witness of the Church, will begin to appear also to others, to lead them out of fearful self-reference toward the joyful embrace of God's truth revealed in His Son.

Blessing our classrooms

To begin 2022, NDHS continued an amazing tradition Sylvia Prefontaine had started years ago by blessing the classrooms. Not only were all of our classrooms, spaces, and entries blessed with Holy Water, but a prayer was said over our students by youth minister, Siobhan Squires. The rooms were silent as students listened respectfully or participated in the prayer within their hearts. The school as whole felt lighter following this practice showing that even in uncertain times, God continues to give us new beginnings and opportunities to make His presence known.



Holy Spirit Catholic Schools

In Holy Spirit Catholic schools, we are guided in our actions by our three year faith plan – Making Our Mark: Journey of an Intentional Disciple. In this year, the final year of the plan, our theme is "Together on the Journey," with a focus on seeing our responsibility to our faith community and each other. As we continue to grow in seeing ourselves and each other as the Body of Christ, we know that we are responsible for translating Jesus from the ideal into the real for those around us. One of the ways that we can do this, and encourage others in Christ is through works of social justice that reflect our own hope in the Lord while showing that hope also to those who are marginalized. While so many works of social justice are ongoing in our school communities, the Christmas season illuminates how Catholic schools are little stars and marks of hope for those around them.

One long standing social justice project that serves our local communities in Holy Spirit is the Santa's Anonymous project. Having operated annually for over twenty years, the Santa's Anonymous group at Catholic Central High School focuses on the works of mercy in constructing food and gift hampers for families in need throughout the division. This year's project supported over fifty families during what can be for many a challenging season.

We also have schools that continue to work to support those in other areas of our world in partnership with Chalice. St. Patrick's Fine Arts Elementary and St. Teresa of Calcutta Elementary each engaged this Christmas season in fundraising to support their respective partner schools, Mateka Primary (Tanzania) and Mkono Wa Mara Primary (Tanzania). Ongoing support of these schools, amongst the many projects in our schools, connects our students to students elsewhere and helps them to understand the many blessings that they have in their own lives as well as their responsibility to help in providing hope to others.

One final example of social justice in Holy Spirit Catholic Schools was the work of the Social Justice Committee at St. Basil Catholic Education Centre. Over the Advent season, weekly challenges based on Matthew 25:35–40 encouraged staff members to bring in socks, mittens, toques, and food items that were assembled into over forty Blessing Bags that were distributed to the marginalized in Lethbridge through the SAGE Clan. Given the intense cold that prevailed throughout the Christmas season, we pray that these bags were a way in which the recipients could feel that the Lord was shining upon them, even for a brief time.

These stories are just a handful of examples of the ways in which our school communities are bringing our Faith Plan to life this year, walking together on a journey as intentional disciples, walking in the light of Christ.
